



RECOGNIZING EXCEPTIONAL GRADUATE STUDENTS

EMERGING PUBLIC POLICY LEADERSHIP AWARD

Since 2003, the American Institute of Biological Sciences has recognized outstanding graduate students with the Emerging Public Policy Leadership Award. The award is presented to current Master's and doctoral students who have demonstrated initiative and leadership in science policy.

Recipients obtain first-hand experience at the interface of science and public policy through their participation in the AIBS Congressional Visits Day. Award winners receive an expense-paid trip to Washington, DC, where they are trained in public policy and communication. They also meet with federal policymakers to discuss investments in the biological sciences.

Past award winners are currently working in congressional offices, federal science agencies, and non-governmental organizations. Many remain engaged in public policy, either through their job or through involvement with professional societies.

The program has been so successful that other scientific societies have initiated similar programs modeled on the AIBS award. The network of Emerging Public Policy Leadership Award winners is growing. AIBS remains in contact with past winners in an effort to build a stronger national science policy community.



Receiving the Emerging Public Policy Leadership Award was an enormously rewarding experience for me. I learned practical tips for communicating with policymakers, the media, and the general public. I could immediately apply these strategies to a full day of congressional meetings to advocate for increased science funding. This experience was a powerful way to hone my skills as a communicator, which will continue to directly benefit my career as a scientist.
